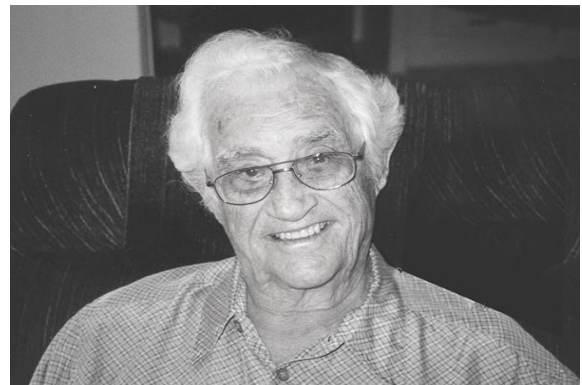

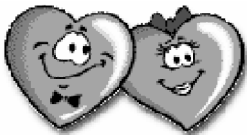

THE NOSTALGICS + ONE

Led by Dick Lawrence of Mesa, Arizona, the Nostalgics have been playing harmonicas in the Valley for many years. Drummer, Jack Sheldon joined the group in November 2001, and the group renamed themselves the Nostalgics +One. They play popular oldies like "Peg O' My Heart, "Misty," "Mack the Knife" and "Harbor Lights." If you like their music – and what's not to like! - they even have a couple of CD's.

This group will grace us with their music on Saturday, March 8th, at 6:30 PM after the Brentwood Days Awards Dinner. Don't miss them!



When this local program started over 30 years ago as Prehab of Arizona, it worked mainly with troubled teens. As they became aware that to help the teens we need to help families, other programs were added. Now two of their main projects are homeless and domestic violence shelters throughout the Phoenix Valley.

LaMesita Family Homeless Shelter is in an old motel the City of Mesa sold to A New Leaf for a dollar. This 30 apartment shelter provides safe temporary housing to over 400 residents annually, as well as offering accredited childcare and youth services, case management, life skills, financial education and job search assistance.

At La Mesita, a family moves into an apartment fitted out with dishes, small appliances, bedding, etc. When they leave, they take everything but the furniture. Then the staff re-outfits the apartment with donated items for the next family.

Autumn House provides shelter to domestic violence victims and their families. It was the first shelter of its kind in the East Valley, opening in 1983. Like La Mesita, Autumn House provides a variety of services in addition to housing. The women "shop" in La Misita's store-room for household items and other needs.

To keep their residents safe, Autumn House is hidden. To be referred there, one must call Maricopa county's CONTACTS (Community Network for Accessing Shelter) hotline (835-5819). Once there, a family can stay for up to 120 days.

Monetary donations to A New Leaf are tax deductible and meet the qualifica-

tions for a dollar for dollar Arizona tax credit of up to \$200 (\$400 if married and filing jointly). We can also donate clothing, household items and even furniture, as long as we deliver them **directly** to La Mesita, at 2254 W. Main St., Mesa (480-834-8723).

A New Leaf does scheduled drives to meet the specific needs of their shelters as follows:

Feb/March: Hygiene and Paper

April/May: Non-perishable food

July/Aug: Back to school items

Sept/Oct: Pillows/Linens

Nov/Dec: Holiday Giving

E-CYCLE DAY



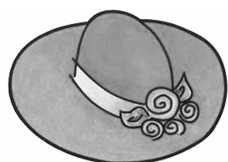
