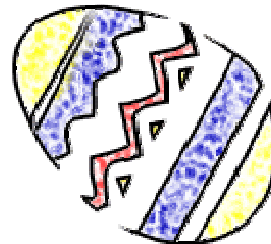

A NEW RECYCLING SYSTEM

We have a new recycling system, one that pays HCC for recyclables. Visit the dumpster area behind the laundry on Hunt Street to see our two new green and yellow dumpsters. ABITTI, a recycling company, pays HCC for paper, plastic, glass and tin cans.

There's a dumpster for all kinds of paper, from cardboard to junk mail to shredded paper and newspapers. There's another dumpster for everything else: all plastic or glass bottles, any tin can, and even aluminum cookware.

Please do not add containers with food waste like whipped topping, cottage cheese, oleo, fast food or yogurt still on them or containers that held hazardous items like car oil or paint. Please break down boxes and cut the large one into smaller sizes. You can leave your papers in a plastic bag for easier hauling and dumping, but please put air holes in the bag if it is tied shut.

HCC is still collecting aluminum soda and beer cans separately. They go to a different place that pays much better for the aluminum. So please continue to put these cans in that covered garbage can behind the dumpsters.



HOW IMPORTANT IS AAMHO IN OUR LIVES?

AAMHO is so important that it can determine the quality of life for the residents of manufactured home parks. Since 1987, it has been the only buffer or protection that exists between the resident and the park owner/manager. Without this organization, a resident is at the complete mercy of the park owner.

State AAMHO Meeting. Our treasurer, Irene Helm, recently attended the state AAMHO meeting. Over 300 people attended representing 94 parks throughout the state. Jean Creagan, AAMHO legislative lobbyist, spoke of the importance of maintaining a political presence and contact with our legislators. She emphasizes that we need to be alert as to what legislation is being proposed and how it will affect us.

AAMHO has worked on many issues – fair water rates for residents, sales use taxes, zoning laws that discriminate against our homes and assisting tenants to move when a park is closed. A premier goal is to protect the manufactured home owner living on leased land. With the help of our knowledgeable lobbyist, AAMHO is working diligently to continue and improve this protection.

Locally, the Brentwood chapter continues to grow with three new members. We have formed a Park Improvement Committee to review concerns from residents. If a park resident feels that there is an issue that needs attention **and that issue can be linked to the Landlord Tenant Act (LTA),** the com-

mittee will review, then recommend a path of action. Our goal is to offer another way for residents to share concerns. Instructions are on the form, which is available in the clubhouse or from any local officer.

The Park Improvement Form, which is also on page 6 of this newsletter for your convenience, stresses that only written, signed forms will be considered and that the issue must be linked to the LTA. For example the recent concern over a committee to watch the speed of cars does not qualify - that is a park management issue, as is dogs walking on the golf course. However park safety - road condition, broken sidewalks, water drainage problems or fire hazards do qualify. Requests from management that do not match the LTA also qualify.

You can find the whole LTA online at [Arizona Revised Statutes](#). Scroll down to Chapter 11 and click on the numbers to read each section. Thom Feit also has a paper copy of the LTA that you can borrow for review.

Meeting with NES. On March 18th, Thom Feit and Chuck Heit met with a representative from NES, the company that handles utility services billing for Brentwood owners to discuss issues brought forward by residents. One of the issues concerns the need for residents without direct withdrawal to **submit a Temporary Absence form 30 days before the 15th of the month prior to leaving (up to 45 days prior!)** so that NES will have your correct billing address.

Further discussion about this issue and others addressed at the meeting will be discussed in this column next month.

Park Improvement Committee
The Highlands at Brentwood AAMHO

If a park resident has a concern which has been conveyed to park management without a satisfactory response, that resident may complete this form for a review of the issue by the Park Improvement Committee.

Procedure:

- The issue must be given by the party directly affected; no hearsay or third-party issues will be accepted.
- At least two members of the Park Improvement Committee will evaluate the issue and report back to the complainant with their recommendation.
- If needed, a representative of the local AAMHO branch, and the complainant will take the written complaint to park management.
- If the issue cannot be resolved to the satisfaction of those involved, consideration shall then be given for a referral to AAMHO.

Please be specific. Include any documentation, photos, etc. you feel would assist in making clear the problem.

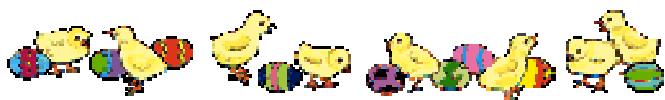

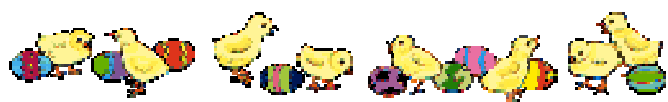


LADIES LUNCHEON

There will be no more tournaments until fall. However, players can still look forward to regular M, W, F play and the ladies still play on Thursdays.

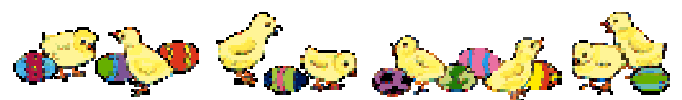


BILLARDS
