(last few lines)

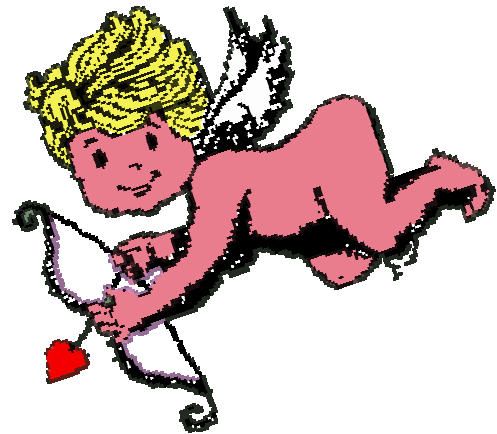
Some live by

the cusp --

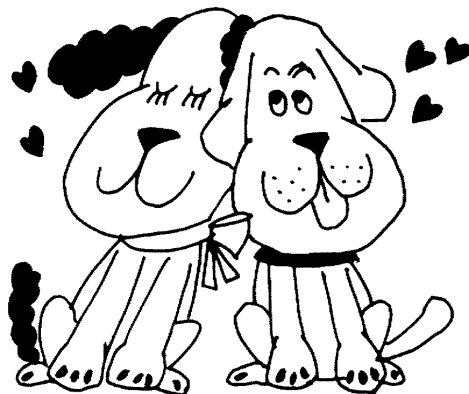

AND YOU

When Irene Helm and Thom Feit attended the January District 1 AAMHO meeting they found that the issues concerning us here are echoed in other parks. Items discussed:

AAMHO and the residents of Coyote Ranch Park in Yuma are confident that the issue (reported here last month) of a new park management company negating leases and creating new higher lease rates will soon be resolved in favor of the residents. While the 43% rate increase would be negated, the management would be allowed to increase lease rates in keeping with Arizona law. This positive outcome is the result of AAMHO work and the resident's resolve.

In this time of critical state budget problems, it is important for us to monitor our legislators work to make sure the Relocation Fund for mobile home owners is not raided to solve shortfalls in other areas. One thing you can do is write or email our legislators when an issue arises. Watch the bulletin board in front of our clubhouse. Our district legislators are:

On Thursday, February 12th, AAMHO is sponsoring a Tenant's Rights Workshop. The workshop will be held at Tempe Public Library 3500 S. Rural Rd. in Tempe, AZ 85282 from 6:00 pm to 8:45 pm. The goal is to inform residents about their rights as established through the *Arizona Mobile Home Parks Residential Landlord & Tenant Act*. If you'd like to car pool to the workshop, contact Thom Feit. To attend, you must register for the workshop by calling AAMHO at 480-966-9566. You must also be an AAMHO member. If you aren't already a member, you can contact our local treasurer, Irene Helm, #227, 248-7998, to sign up. Yearly dues are just \$24.

On Saturday, February 21, AAMHO will hold an open membership and information meeting in the clubhouse right after the pancake breakfast, from 9-10 AM. Watch for notices on the bulletin board, outside the clubhouse

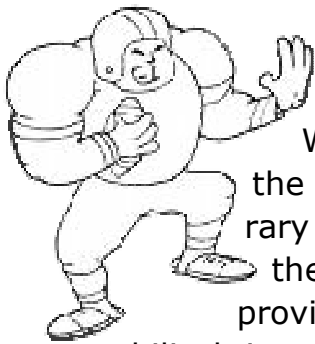

SUPER BOWL PARTY

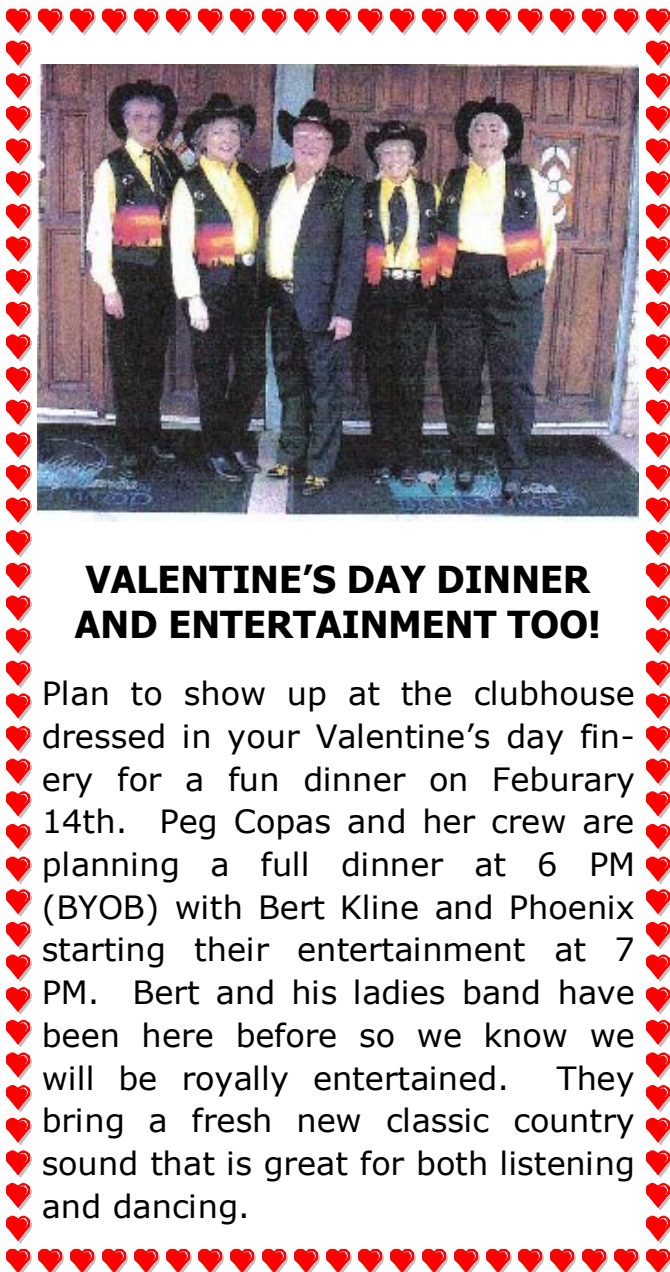

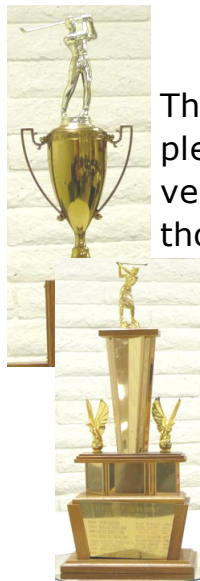

DICK AND LEILA TURNER

The Turner Cup is named for a couple who were quite active in the development of our golf course although they never lived here. Dick, a good friend of Fred Geisen's, was the pro and course superintendent of the Mesa Country Club in 1982, when our course was built. All for free, Dick designed our course, helped to rebuild the greens and monitored the course regularly until he and his wife Leila moved to Texas, where they now live.

In 1983, Fred organized an annual match play tournament he called the Championship Tournament which would produce both a Men's and a Women's Champion. Dick donated a permanent trophy for the men. Leila, an Arizona Seniors Amateur Champion, donated a trophy for the women. In addition, for two years they came here and played on a regular golfing day so we could have a "Beat the Pro" day just like the country clubs had.

In 1992, the Brentwood Golf Association renamed the Championship Cup the "Turner Cup" in honor of Dick and Leila Turner.
